

Land

I always find it interesting that every building project starts with great plans and the first thing you know, the unforeseen begin to pop up.

When the pool/deck project finally began, it didn't take long to discover that the lumber from the deck structure that we had hoped to reuse was not going to be salvageable. It was all non-treated pine and so was rotting and spitting and the only thing it was good for was building a fire. We had suspected that may be the case, and so were not terribly surprised. As a side note, since everyone has spent the summer staying at home working on projects due to the Covid, building materials, especially pressure treated lumber, are in somewhat of a short supply. Hopefully it will improve by spring.

Next we discovered tree roots were coming up under the pool and that the root ball of the big pine tree was presenting more of a problem than we had previously thought. It was going to render a large portion of the deck unusable. At this point, the somewhat sad but necessary decision was made to remove the pine and the maple on the grass.

On the up side of doing all the tree removal, we were presented with some interesting options for the replacement of the pool and deck. We now have the opportunity to shift the pool location roughly 10 feet to the West. Also with the removal of the Maple and its roots, we can extend the deck to the West over where the grass has been. All of this will give us the ability to have lounge chairs the complete 360* around the pool and still have plenty of walking space. This will be an area that will serve us well for many more years of fun and relaxation.

Many thanks to all those who helped with the demolition work. At this point, with the exception of a small amount of excavation to be performed in the spring, we are now ready to begin construction work starting in April (weather permitting). If you were not able to make it up for demolition, never fear. As the building begins, we are going to need lots of help. The plan is to have multiple crews addressing various portions of the project simultaneously whenever possible. In addition, we will still have all the normal projects of opening the mountain for the season.

With that said -, stay safe and rest well this winter. The new year will provide us many opportunities to join in the camaraderie we all share at the Mountain. Brent H
