Ed and I booked a cabin for the first time on May 20 and 21<sup>st</sup> and we arrived with luggage, and food, coolers, books, and computers etc. The cart was invaluable. (Of course, we also brought our own bedding as members are so required.) The cabin was comfortable and clean, and we quickly made up the bed.





Then we started trying to put our stuff away...and realized that the credenza was totally full of bedding. Every drawer. Where were our clothes supposed to go? We realize that being a nudist resort our visitors don't have a LOT of clothes but being a cool spring, we needed more room – and we feel like our visitors would also. #### Bare mtn ...then and now

(This is the second installment (page two) of a five-page history that was presented to the editor by Ron W. at the membership meeting held Saturday, May 21,2022. Watch in the coming issues of the ROAR for our continued history).

PRINCIPLES: We believe in the essential wholesomeness of all human bodies and of the natural functions and activities which they perform. We believe in the naturalness of social nudism, and we consider that exposure of the entire human body to sun, light, and air is beneficial. We believe that we have the right to practice social nudism provided that we do not infringe on the rights of others.

The first newsletters didn't contain much information because there was less activity at that time. We met once a month at an outing or in people's homes. These newsletters were all typed by hand, using carbon paper, so consequently, not every letter had all the same information nor were all the words spelled the same.

The early activities were trips to hot springs, socializing at member's homes (with our now famous potluck meals), and visiting other clubs. We were dreaming of the future, a place to call home for all of us. A place where we could accommodate 25-30 people at a time and a place where we could come and go as we wanted "El natural".

This dream became more of a reality with the construction of Don & Betty's recreation building in the Winter and Spring of 1982. Bud and Dorothy's donations of the pool and the construction of the board fence (8 feet high) to enclose the back yard surrounding the recreation building. We had leaks in the roof and no bathroom in the recreation building. We had more and more people joining our club as they could see we had something that could and would fit into their lives.

In 1985, we went all out when the club members donated their time and labor to install bathroom (just like UPTOWN!!) More members visited the club house, as that was what it was called, and probably will be called that forever by us. More and more visited as they no longer felt they were invading our privacy with the new bathroom in the club house. Visitors were out during the week not just on scheduled events.

We still had our dreams, the dream of owning our own campgrounds and the dream of getting our membership up to 50 members. I don't believe that too many of the members cared if we had a private ownership campground or a co-operative type, we just knew we had to have one. Many miles of traveling and many hours of research was done on many pieces of property with several offers being made. There was always, zoning, financing, rights of way, or that it was not the right piece of property that delayed us in getting what we wanted. Some of us spent many hours and hundreds of dollars for all the preparation for the future campground.

Things are still improving. We have a bigger and better newsletter. Would you believe the carbon paper is gone and these new things called computers can store up and print out what you put into it?
