WE need new ideas to grow our mtn community.

Then as the members read these ideas they can add to them in the next newsletter or explain (NICELY) why they feel it will or will not work. Hopefully we can get some good conversations going between our members old and new.

We are starting this off with:

Beautification Committee

As you may know, the Board approved a new committee starting 2022. What will this committee do? The outline (subject to change and evolve) is as follows:

- 1. Gather a group of volunteers to beautify our mountain home.
- 2. Gather ideas, costs, and information to present to the Board for project approval.
- 3. Prioritize projects financially feasible.
- 4. Complete approved projects.
- 5. Maintain completed projects.
- 6. Set up an "Adopt a garden" list.

This committee does not do any maintenance/painting projects on existing buildings, etc., but will coordinate with the land chair on Beautification Committee approved projects.

Some ideas that have been floating around are:

- 1. Build a retaining wall at the sides and lower edge of our "tire garden", fill it with compost dirt and plant flowers and native grasses with possibly a waterfall down the middle.
- 2. Doing away with the sheets of tin on the road up to the clubhouse.
- 3. Planting flowers/erosion control on the hillside below the rental cabins.
- 4. Landscape the West gate outside area.
- 5. Install a watering system for all gardens set on a timer.
- 6. Set up an "Adopt a Road" skeleton weed patrol.
- 7. Install shade "flags" on the common ground.

Some projects will not take any funds, only labor.

Anyone interested on being on this committee please contact Donna, who will be the Board Liaison. Remember, all ideas are welcome! The more to choose from. Your idea may not be done this year, but maybe will be completed in the future. All ideas will be kept in a folder and saved for future projects.

I'm excited to have this opportunity to make our club a welcoming place for members and visitors alike.
